

## *Passenger information about prohibited items on board*

Electra Airways would like to inform all passengers, for their safety, about the items that are safe to be packed in hand and checked baggage so that you can pass through the security screening checkpoints at any airport without an issue.

### *How to pack correctly for safety*

- In your hand baggage you may only carry liquids in containers that hold a maximum of 100 ml each and make no more than 1 liter in total.
- Pack these containers into a re-sealable 1-liter plastic bag.
- Pack spare batteries and power banks (charging devices with a battery) in your hand baggage only, because they may not be placed in checked baggage. Protect batteries individually against short circuits.
- Containers with more than 100 ml of liquids, as well as knives and scissors with blades over 6 cm in length, are only permitted in checked baggage.
- If you are traveling only with hand baggage, you may not take these items with you on your journey.
- Liquid medication, baby food, and special foods required during the flight can be transported in containers of more than 100 ml in your hand baggage (upon security check/screening).
- Electronic cigarettes, lighters, and matches may not be placed in your checked baggage. You may however carry a lighter or box of matches on you personally and e-cigarettes in hand baggage only.
- Portable oxygen concentrators for medical use need to be approved by the airline and may be carried in hand baggage only.

### *Passing Through the Security Check Quickly*

Have the following items ready to place separately into the baggage trays and follow the instructions of the security staff:

- Empty your pockets and put your purses and wallets, coins, mobile telephone, and keys in the trays for X-ray screening;
- Take your belt, jacket, coat, and/or blazer off in advance;
- Display the 1-litre plastic bag containing your liquid items of up to 100 ml each;
- Show liquid medication, baby food and special food item(s) of over 100 ml;
- Expose tax & duty-free items (with purchase receipt in a sealed bag);
- Remove your portable computer, laptop, tablet, and camera from your bag.

### *Prohibited items*

Please note that it is prohibited by law to check in or carry dangerous goods on board an aircraft.

*Violations may be subject to legal penalties or fines.*

Below are some common items forbidden to carry on aircraft, neither on the person nor in checked and carry-on luggage. Explosives, flammable liquids, toxic, and corrosive substances, such as:

- Sparklers, fireworks/signal flares
- Disabling devices (mace, pepper spray)
- Electroshock weapons (tasers)
- Torch/Blue flame/Wick lighters, petrol, lighter refills (liquid or gas), strike-anywhere matches
- Camping fuel, solid fuel (paste)
- Camping stoves / Filled scuba tanks
- Engine-powered equipment (chainsaws, generators, etc.)
- Liquid oxygen systems
- Paints/acids/wet cell batteries/caustic materials
- Gases/gas cartridges/pressure containers
- Substances liable to spontaneous combustion
- Substances that emit flammable gases in contact with water
- Repellent for reptiles, mammals, animal spray
- Damaged batteries and equipment
- Poisonous (toxic) and infectious substances - weed killers, insecticides, etc.
- Oxidizing substances such as bleaching powder, peroxides, some fertilizers
- Radioactive materials
- Strongly magnetic materials
- Guns, Firearms, Ammunition
- Tools capable of causing serious injury or posing a safety threat
- Lithium battery-powered vehicles (hoverboards, scooters, segways, solo wheels, bikes) other than wheelchair/mobility equipment
- Loose Lithium Batteries with power capacity exceeding 160 Wh or lithium metal content exceeding 8 g. Wh = V X Ah
- Baggage with installed non-removable lithium batteries exceeding 0,3 g lithium metal or 2,7 Wh
- More than 70% alcohol by volume

### *List of prohibited items in cabin baggage*

Passengers are not permitted to carry the following articles into security-restricted areas and on board an aircraft:

1. Guns, firearms, and other devices that discharge projectiles – devices capable, or appearing capable, of being used to cause serious injury by discharging a projectile, including:
  - firearms of all types, such as pistols, revolvers, rifles, and shotguns;
  - toy guns, replicas, and imitation firearms capable of being mistaken for real weapons; component parts of firearms, excluding telescopic sights;
  - compressed air and CO2 guns, such as pistols, pellet guns, rifles, ball bearing guns, signal flare pistols, and starter pistols;

- bows, crossbows, arrows, harpoon guns, spear guns, slingshots, and catapults.
2. *Stunning devices – devices designed specifically to stun or immobilize, including:*
    - devices for shocking, such as stung guns, tasers and stun batons, animal stunners and animal killers
    - disabling and incapacitating chemicals, gases, and sprays, such as “mace”, pepper sprays, capsicum sprays, tear gas, acid sprays, and animal repellent sprays.
  3. *Objects with a sharp point or sharp edge – objects with a sharp point or sharp edge capable of being used to cause serious injury, including:*
    - items designed for chopping, such as axes, hatches, and cleavers
    - knives with blades of more than 6 cm
    - blades, box cutters
    - scissors with blades of more than 6 cm as measured from the fulcrum
    - martial arts equipment with a sharp point or sharp edge
    - swords and sabers
  4. *Workmen’s tools – tools capable of being used either to cause serious injury or to threaten the safety of aircraft, including:*
    - drills and drill bits, including cordless portable power drills
    - tools with a blade or a shaft of more than 6 cm capable of use as a weapon, such as screwdrivers and chisels
    - saws, including cordless portable power saws
    - blowtorches, bolt guns, and nail guns
    - crowbars
  5. *Blunt instruments – objects capable of being used to cause serious injury when used to hit, including:*
    - baseball and softball bats
    - clubs and batons, such as billy clubs, blackjacks, and night sticks
    - martial arts equipment
  6. *Explosives and incendiary substances and devices – explosives and incendiary substances and devices capable, or appearing capable, of being used to cause serious injury or to pose a threat to the safety of aircraft, including:*
    - ammunition, blasting caps, detonators and fuses
    - replica or imitation explosive devices
    - mines, grenades, and other explosive military stores
    - fireworks and other pyrotechnics
    - smoke-generating canisters and smoke-generating cartridges
    - dynamite, gunpowder, and plastic explosives

### *List of prohibited items in hold (checked) baggage*

*Passengers are not permitted to carry the following articles in their hold (checked) baggage:*

Explosives and incendiary substances and devices – explosives and incendiary substances and devices that can be used to cause serious injury or pose a threat to the safety of the aircraft, including:

- ammunition;
- capsule detonators;
- Explosives (including detonators and fuses);
- mines, grenades and other explosive-laden containers;
- fireworks and other pyrotechnic devices;
- smoke bombs and cartridges;
- dynamite, gunpowder, and plastic explosives.
- Electronic cigarettes
- Power banks and spare batteries

### *Spare batteries and power banks*

You may not take any spare batteries or power banks (charging devices with batteries) in your checked baggage. You may take a maximum of two spare batteries with a rating of 100 Watt-hours up to 160 Watt-hours in your hand baggage.

Batteries must be individually protected from damage and short circuit. Batteries installed in a device (Lithium-Ion - up to 100 Watt-hours, Lithium-metal – up to 2g Lithium content) may be carried in either your hand baggage or checked baggage. Batteries with a power capacity of over 160 Watt-hours are prohibited.

### *Self-stabilizing, electric means of transport (hoverboards)*

Lithium battery-powered vehicles are prohibited in both hand baggage and checked baggage. This ban does not apply to wheelchairs or other mobility aids. Please contact us at [customersupport@electra-airways.com](mailto:customersupport@electra-airways.com) before you travel.

### *Diving equipment*

As they generate heat, diving lamps cannot be placed in checked baggage. They may be transported in hand baggage provided that the power supply has been disconnected. Please, note that SCUBA tanks must be completely empty with the valve open or removed.
